# COURSE: SP-07 SPANISH CIVILIZATION AND CULTURE

## LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION: Spanish and English

### DESCRIPTION

This course provides students with an understanding of what is Spain today from different perspectives: social, political, cultural, historical... Focusing our efforts on the recent period students I learn the "reality" or "realities" of Spain today. The course deals with the most important topics that Spaniards care and worry about: The current economic situation, the unemployment rates in Spain, the separatist movement in Catalonia and the Basque Country, the current political system, the European Union, Migratory movements, among others. Needless to say that the students will also learn about the most relevant historical periods of the History of Spain and the different cultures, cuisines, folklore in Spain.

## **CLASS FORMAT:**

Class will be very interactive and communication among students and teacher will be very relevant. We use different tools in the classroom (white board, and other types of support) to make the class lively and interesting for students. Students have daily reading assignments for the different topics of the course. Students are expected to come to class ready and with the ready assignments prepared so they may participate actively in class discussions.

Videos, documentaries and other visual materials are used as supporting means of teaching during the length of this course. Visits to different cultural, social and political institutions will take place during the course.
